GLOBAL INNOVATION CHALLENGE

Team ALIVEAN consisting of 4 students namely Mrudul Mumtani, Vraj Rajpura, Ahsan Nayaz and Aryan Krishnan, on winning the GEMS Global Innovation Challenge, travelled to San Francisco, California, to attend a global summit held by The Singularity University based in Silicon Valley. The summit had participants from over 60 countries with more than 100 speakers and over 2000 attendees and 37 expo companies, including Google, Cisco, Microsoft, PepsiCo, etc.

The team had been working on this product for the past 6-8 months. The boys have returned with contacts of potential investors and technical experts for their product, including companies such as Deloitte. The boys have raised the bar of excellence in OOB, by proving to everyone, age does not limit innovation.



Their product was a pair of glasses for the visually impaired, which had cameras mounted on them which captures visual information, sends it to a processing chip, running on AI, converts this visual information into audio information hence informing the visually impaired person about his surroundings. Not only does the device identify objects, with an added touch of machine learning, it is capable of adding objects to its datasets, and distinguishing between colours, faces and multiple objects. Lastly, in order to perfect indoor navigation, the team has been working with people at Singularity and other experts to include 'indoor mapping' to make this a fully-fledged and complete product.

It was right after my 11th grade PT1 that I met with a near sports career ending injury. I was mentally prepared and physically fit for the first tournament for the past two years. After not playing when I was in my 10th grade, due to the board exams, I'd never been this thrilled for a basketball match. My whole life revolved around this sport, every song I listened to, every long walk I'd gone for and every single time I daydreamed: it was all about this game because this was all I had during my introverted phase.

Right after the half time, I tore my right ankle's ligament in a very messy rebound for the ball. My teammates came-up to me to help me get up so that we could get our well deserved win that we had all been waiting for, but I couldn't. I couldn't feel anything from my right ankle to my toes. They had to carry me off the court and later we went on to lose the match.

After the XRAY was taken the doctor told me that I may never be able to play the same way again and that 'this could be it'. Those four words were enough to shatter a child's dream of becoming something big in life.

The next few months were an absolute disaster for me as I couldn't cope up with all that had happened to me, lying down at home, restless, crying and cursing myself for this whole tragedy.



When I was finally able to walk I realized that this injury could have been one of the greatest things that ever happened to me. I started finding and trying out new hobbies, socializing with people and actually made some friends of my own. All of these changes were new to me as I used to think that basketball would be enough to keep me occupied my entire life.

This injury made me realize that there are equally greater things out there in this world and it was all a simple way of redirecting me to it. It was just a way of taking me to a path that I never thought Iwould take and to show me that there are things that are more rewarding, there are things that are more fulfilling and there are

things that will carry you further for your whole life. No matter how bad life gets, we're never put in a situation that we cannot overcome. There's never really a reason that you cannot overcome and that you can't find a way to put those pieces back together. What's happened, has happened and there's nothing one can do about it but it's our decision to either sit and weep and wail, thinking about our weakest spots and incidents or, to hold on to it and mend them in a way that makes us much stronger for us to come back on to our feet. That's what I believed in and now I'm in a much healthier and better state than Ive ever been before and I'm still aiming for that win.
